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ALLEGAN COUNTY 4-H HORSEMASTER PROGRAM LEVEL ONE

Level one in the Horsemaster Program is the beginning of the 4-Her's contact and association with horses. It is also the beginning of their experiences in the Allegan County Horse & Pony Project program.

To complete Level One, each 4-H Member should be able to:

- Identify 10 parts of the horse
- Identify proper feeds
- Learn how to properly tie a horse
- Identify 10 safety precautions
- Identify proper grooming tools (examples)
- Identify parts of a saddle and bridle
- Identify two horse colors (picture and descriptions)
- Identify one breed of horse (picture and characteristics)
- ** You must earn a 85% or higher score to pass HorseMaster Level One**

Horsemaster Level booklets have been combined with the Allegan County 4-H Horse Notebook program.

The requirement for Notebooks are following (in this order):

- 1. Decorative cover
- 2. Title page (must have title, name, club, year in project)
- Table of Contents or Index (updated each year)
- 4. Current year personal story and pictures (Should include: name, age, school grade, family, pets, description of horse/pony, what was learned in the project year, other projects, club activities, non 4-H activities and goals.)
- 5. Horse & Pony Feed & Care Record and Stable Record Card (4-H 1072 & 4-H 1073) (12 months required September 1 August 31)

Yearly requirements:

- a. Reports pertaining to subject (all articles from magazines must have a summary of what you learned from it.)
- b. Diagrams, pictures drawn or cut out
- c. Samples or collections and they must be attached to the notebook.

A notebook should be neat and clean.

- 1. Pages should be neatly arranged, numbered and put in protective covering.
- 2. All reports can be in longhand, typed or done on computer.
- 3. Notebooks must be indexed by years and have dividers between each year and numbering sequence.
- 4. Pages should be written so they are easily read.

Notebooks should start with the member's current year in the 4-H Horse Project and then added in as desired. (Example: 4th year member starts with 4th year notebook requirements and may add in earlier year requirements as desired).



Identification of Proper Feeds (5 points)

Feeding and Nutrition

An average horse (1000 lbs. body weight) will consume approximately 15 to 20 pounds of a combination of hay, pasture and grain (total ration) each day. The major component of a horse's diet is good forage such as alfalfa, grass hay or pasture. Horses require five types of nutrients:

- 1. Water 4. Vitamins
- Energy (carbohydrates and fats)
 Minerals
- 3. Protein

HORSE COAT COLORS & BREEDS

<u>Colors:</u> A good horseperson needs a working knowledge of horse colors. The first and most important group is the basic coat colors. There are five basic horse coat colors.



Bay: A bay colored horse may be hard to describe, but easy to distinguish. It is a mixture of red and yellow. A light bay shows more yellow and a dark bay, more red. The darkest is the mahogany bay, which is almost the color of blood, but without the overtones. Bays always have black points (black mane, tail and lower portion of the legs, except for any white marking on the legs).

Black: A black horse almost invariably has black eyes, hooves and skin, the points are also black. Tan or brown hairs on the muzzle or flank indicated that the horse is not a true black but a seal brown.

Brown: A brown horse is one with brown coloration. Many brown horses are mistakenly called black, because they are so dark. A close examination of the hair on the muzzle and around the lips will quickly tell whether the horse is brown or black. The mane and tail are always dark.

Chestnut: (Sorrel) A chestnut horse is basically red. The mane and tail are normally the same shade as the body. If the mane and tail are lighter in color than the body, the horse is termed a flax or flaxen chestnut. The mane and tail of a chestnut horse are never black. Chestnut varies from a bright yellowish red to a rich mahogany red.

White: A white horse has snow-white hair, pink skin and brown eyes. The true white is born pure white and dies the same color. Very little, if any, seasonal change takes place in the coat color. Age does not affect it.

<u>Breeds:</u> There are more than 350 breeds of horses and ponies. From working and racing to casual riding and equestrian competition, each horse has its special qualities. But there are five particular breeds that stand out and capture the hearts of horse lovers everywhere.
