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# ALLEGAN COUNTY 4-H HORSEMASTER PROGRAM LEVEL TWO

Level two in the Horsemaster Program will build on your knowledge of how to bridle, saddle and mount your horse. In addition, you will learn about feet care, parasites and first aid. You will develop an unique partnership with your horse as you understand more about the horse's nature and develop better balance.

To complete Level Two, each 4-H Member should be able to:

- Identify 20 parts of the horse
- Know how to bridle, saddle and mount
- Know proper care of the feet
- Know how to take care of an overheated horse
- Know proper care and use of equipment
- Identify two internal and external parasites
- Identify one first aid application
- Identify two more horse colors (picture and descriptions) \*Must be different from Level 1\*

### \*\* You must earn a 85% or higher score to pass HorseMaster Level Two\*\*

Horsemaster Level booklets have been combined with the Allegan County 4-H Horse Notebook program.

### The requirement for Notebooks are following (in this order):

- 1. Decorative cover
- Title page (must have title, name, club, year in project)
- 3. Table of Contents or Index (updated each year)
- 4. Current year personal story and pictures (Should include: name, age, school grade, family, pets, description of horse/pony, what was learned in the project year, other projects, club activities, non 4-H activities and goals.)
- 5. Horse & Pony Feed & Care Record and Stable Record Card (4-H 1072 & 4-H 1073) (12 months required September 1 August 31)

### <u>Yearly requirements:</u>

- a. Reports pertaining to subject (all articles from magazines must have a summary of what you learned from it.)
- b. Diagrams, pictures drawn or cut out
- c. Samples or collections and they must be attached to the notebook.

### A notebook should be neat and clean.

- 1. Pages should be neatly arranged, numbered and put in protective covering.
- 2. All reports can be in longhand, typed or done on computer.
- 3. Notebooks must be indexed by years and have dividers between each year and numbering sequence.
- Pages should be written so they are easily read.

Notebooks should start with the member's current year in the 4-H Horse Project and then added in as desired. (Example: 4th year member starts with 4th year notebook requirements and may add in earlier year requirements as desired).





# How To Saddle, Bridle and Mount (10 points)

### Mounting

Please read the instructions below on how to properly mount a horse and then answer the questions.



To mount a horse, make sure you are on a level area. Then, stand on the horse's left side and angle the stirrup towards your left foot. Next, gather the reins and a bit of the mane with your left hand, and place your foot in the stirrup. Grab the offside of the saddle with your right hand and quickly pull yourself onto your horse's back and place your right foot into the stirrup. Your horse should be paying attention to you and not trying to walk off while you are mounting. As a safety tip, always stay calm and quiet while mounting your horse.





## HORSE COAT COLORS

<u>Colors:</u> A good horseperson needs a working knowledge of horse colors. The first and most important group is the basic coat colors. There are five basic horse coat colors.

**Bay:** A bay colored horse may be hard to describe, but easy to distinguish. It is a mixture of red and yellow. A light bay shows more yellow and a dark bay, more red. The darkest is the mahogany bay, which is almost the color of blood, but without the overtons. Bays always have black points (black mane, tail and lower portion of the legs, except for any white marking on the legs).

**Black:** A black horse almost invariably has black eyes, hooves and skin, the points are also black. Tan or brown hairs on the muzzle or flank indicated that the horse is not a true black but a seal brown.

**Brown:** A brown horse is one with brown coloration. Many brown horses are mistakenly called black, because they are so dark. A close examination of the hair on the muzzle and around the lips will quickly tell whether the horse is brown or black. The mane and tail are always dark.

**Chestnut:** (Sorrel) A chestnut horse is basically red. The mane and tail are normally the same shade as the body. If the mane and tail are lighter in color than the body, the horse is termed a flax or flaxen chestnut. The mane and tail of a chestnut horse are never black. Chestnut varies from a bright yellowish red to a rich mahogany red.

White: A white horse has snow-white hair, pink skin and brown eyes. The true white is born pure white and dies the same color. Very little, if any, seasonal change takes place in the coat color. Age does not affect it.
