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4-H Code of Conduct

Positive behavior is a key expectation for youth and adults participating in 4-H activities – behavior that reflects trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. Participants are expected to exhibit good sportsmanship and follow all event rules. Theft, vandalism, the use of illegal drugs, alcohol, tobacco or electronic cigarettes, inappropriate or threatening behavior that violates the rights of others, and other such offenses are strictly prohibited, and anyone involved with these offenses will immediately be sent home at his or her own expense. If it is determined by 4-H staff or persons in charge of the activity that the offense warrants it, the offender will be turned over to the proper authorities. Participants are expected to take responsibility for their own actions and encouraged to inform their 4-H leader or 4-H Staff if another person is mistreating them.

Date Requirements for Fair

Leaders:

March 1: Turn in pre-registration "pink sheet" with members showing horses.

Note to Leaders: Coggins and Shots must be stapled to the Point show/Fair preregistration torm. You may not turn in your club's forms until all of your 4-H'ers forms are present. Thease have your forms STAPLED and turned in On time...

April 30 or at Fun Show - <u>Turn in ALLof your club's Horse Declaration Packets</u> to one of the Board Members, this will include the following:

- Horse Blue Declaration form or Green for Young Clovers, include backup horses (if desired, but shot and coggins are not required until used) A horse must be on one of these forms to be used for 4H. Can be from another club's sheet.
- Coggins shot form and receipt for every declared horse with the *child's* name on each peice of paper.
- Pre-registration form for Point Show and Fair class selections
- Turn in Team comp forms and t-shirt payment


June Point Show

- Notebook Judging is done for EVERYONE except Young Clovers.
- Turn in Community Service Forms at announcer's booth (you may have leader collect and turn in as a club)
- State Delegate Forms (exact date to be announced)
- Community service forms (if you want them to count points towards state delegate and high point) must be turned in by this show

June _Leaders Meeting-

- Give barn superintendent number of horses needing sawdust
- July
- To attend fair with a horse, youth must complete either:
- A. (record keeping plus 2 topics from appropriate age level old workbook and the 4H Horse/Pony and My 4H Story
- B. A Poster/educational display plus Record Keeping with 4H Horse/Pony and My 4H Story
- Have it judged on non-livestock day.

April Club Meeting

- Horses must be in members possession as of April 30th so that shots, Coggins, and pre-registration for classes can be turned in by the leader.
- Staple the following together and turn in for each declared horse. Make sure your child's name is on the top of the Coggins and shot receipt as sometimes names on coggins or shot receipt do not match.

These can also be turned in at the Fun and fuzzy 50/50 Show:

- Coggins
- Shot Form and Proof of shots (receipt)
 - Eastern/Western sleeping sickness, Tetanus, Influenza, Rhino
- Point Show / Fair Class Selection Form Fully Completed Make
 - sure to make a copy for yourself.
 - Community service forms are to be turned in either with the above information or by the First Point Show. Box will be at the Fun and fuzzy Show, June Point Show.
- This gives you additional points towards state show.

June Point Show

- State Show- Worker Signup (NO WORKERS!) NO DELEGATES!)
- Community Service forms are due at the first show to earn points for state and high points.
- Turn in Team Comp registration and money to leader.

July To attend fair with a horse, youth must complete either:

- A. Record Book with My 4H Story and My 4H Horse/Pony and 2 topics from age appropriate workbook
- B. Record Book with My 4H Story and My 4h Horse/Pony and a Poster or/educational display
- Must exhibit it on NON-Livestock Day at the Fair (Saturday before horses are brought in on Sunday).

4-H Horse Workouts, Helmets & Leased/Borrowed Horse Projects

4-H Horse Workouts -

The purpose of having workouts at the fairgrounds is;

- o For the 4-H leaders to provide 4-H members education in various riding disciplines and/or ground work.
- o To assist 4-H members preparing their horses for shows and fair.
- o For the 4-H member and their horse/pony to become familiar with the surroundings at the fairgrounds prior to the fair.
- If 4-H Leaders (defined as an adult volunteer who has completed the VSP process) who are experienced riders wish to bring in their horse and ride with their club members as a teaching aid they may 6 so.
- The safety of our youth is of utmost-importance. In the event there is a safety issue during a workout, a 4-H leader, who is an experienced rider, may to get on the member's horse to assist in working out the problem.
- It is MSUE Barry County policy that workouts are not an open exercise time for anyone outside of 4-H members (currently errolled in Barry County

4-H).

- MSUE Liability Insurance covers volunteers serving in a 4-H volunteer capacity at a 4-H sanctioned event.
- The Insurance purchased by the Horse Developmental is only in effect for the fun show, series, open shows and tack sale
- Be sure to follow all laws/rules and safety precautions when transporting both youth and horses.
- If a 4-H member leases or borrows a horse for 4-H, the 4-H member participate in the club they are a member of with the leased or borrowed horse.

Helmets -

Rule #1 in the fair book safety rules states "SEI safety helmets must be worn by 4-H members, parents, leaders and all youth exhibitors while mounted at any 4-H event. Young Clovers must wear helmets at all times when handlinghorse.

Barry County 4-H Leased/Borrowed Horses Projects

- Horses may be leased or borrowed for 4-H projects.
- Owner of the horse that is leased or borrowed may not stipulate the 4-H Club the member using the horse participates in. This choice is up to the family leasing or borrowing the horse.
- Parents & owners work out the agreement, 4-H is not involved.
 - o Things to think about include transportation, care, shows and practices.
 - o The leased or borrowed horses are expected to be at the club workouts/events. How they get there needs to be worked out as part of the agreement.
 - o 4-H members are expected to follow the rules of the 4-H Club they belong to.
- The expectation is that 4-H members participate in the club they are a member of with the leased or borrowed horse.

HIGH POINT SELECTION SYSTEM

POINTS;
$$1^{ST} - 6$$
, $2^{ND} - 5$, $3^{RD} - 4$, $4^{TH} - 3$, $5^{TH} - 2$, $6^{TH} - 1$

Points are based on the judge's discretion which means they are allowed to give however many points they feel a member deserves based on how well they performed in a class. Just because you receive first place does not always mean you will get six points and as well for the rest of the placings. Also, points may be divided by as much as a ½ point (example 5.5) if a judge feels it was a close decision in placing the class.

These are just EXTRA points at "FAIR ONLY" if you receive one of the medals and/or a ribbon award.

Gold Medal – 3 points A ribbon award – 3 points

Silver Medal – 2 points B ribbon award – 2 points

Bronze Medal – 1 point C ribbon award – 1 point

**Each member that does Showmanship at the Point Show and Fair receives 2 extra points.

Community Service: each member receives 10 points.

Questions: members are asked 3 questions and for each correct answer they receive 2 points each and if close they may get 1 point. Questions are given Thursday morning of Fair week. Questions come from the Horse Science Book and Horse and Horsemanship Book.

High Point

Seniors 1st – 6th placings

Juniors 1st – 6th placings

Novice 1st & 2nd placings

Walk/Trot 1st & 2nd placings

Total points are accumulated from last year's fair and questions. This year's Point Show and Community Service. Trophies and ribbons are awarded for these placings.

STATE SHOW

The State Show is based on the total points each member has accumulated from last year's fair and questions, this year's point show, and community service. Whoever receives the highest total scores is eligible to attend the State Show. We will send 14 Delegates and 4 Alternates.

Ages for State Show (determined as of January 1st) 12 - 19 years.

(Juniors 12 – 15 years, Seniors 16 – 19 years)

**NOVICE AND WALK/TROT ARE NOT ELIGIBLE FOR STATE SHOW. SHOW OF CHAMPIONS

The Grand Champion Senior and Junior Showmanship winners are eligible for the Show of Champions which is held last Saturday of Fair. If you are unable to compete or will compete with a different species, please contact one of the board members or the Reserve Champion as soon as possible, in order to give them time to work with the other species as well. Once you have won the Show of Champions as Grand Champion, you are no longer able to compete in this event.

GUIDELINES FOR HORSE/PONY RECORD BOOK AND WORKBOOK

- 1 To attend fair with a horse, youth must complete either a workbook or a Poster/educational display and with Record Keeping Section
- 2. The workbook includes
- A Two topics from the age appropriate prior versions of the workbook as determined by the leader **or**
- B. An educational poster/project

<u>And</u> a record keeping section with and My Horse/Pony Story and My 4H Story

- 3. Judge will judge only current year record book. Previous workbooks will be included in the binder, but will not reflect on year being judged. Include a divider between each record book.
- 4. It will be the leader's discretion as to what workbook youth need to complete for the current year.
- 5. A table of contents will be required for all workbook and record books (except Young Clovers).
- 6. All record books must include a score sheet in the front of the record book.
- 7. Score sheets need to be kept in the record book until fair.
- 8. Record books and workbook educational project must be judged on Non-Livestock Day of Fair.

Horse Markings: Draw a picture showing the different face and leg markings.

Horse Talk: Discuss how horses talk, sounds they make and body language.

Western Saddle: Show a picture and label the parts.

Western Bridle and Bits: Show a picture and label the parts of the bridle. Show a picture of a curb bit and a snaffle bit. Explain the differences between the bits.

Unsoundness: Thrush and founder, what are they and how are they treated?

<u>Horse Health:</u> Tell what a healthy horse looks like and how he acts. What can you do to keep your horse healthy?

<u>Colors of Horses:</u> Describe these six colors - gray, palomino, roan, dun Appaloosa, paint/pinto.

Hoof Care: Describe daily care and routine farrier care, trimming/shoeing.

<u>English Bridle and Bits and Saddle:</u> Saddle, bridle, kimberwick and pelham, show a picture of each and label the parts.

Basic Tack Care: Describe how to clean tack and what products to use.

Ten Safety Rules

Vices: Shying and biting, why do they happen and how do you stop the vices?

The Aides: Hands, voice and legs, tell how each is used.

WORKBOOK 3

<u>Basic Feeds:</u> Two grains - corn and oats, two hay types - alfalfa and grass, describe each and how the horse benefits from eating each.

<u>Show Grooming:</u> Rub rag, scissors/clippers, sponge, sweat scraper,mane and tail comb. Write a paragraph describing how to groom a horse for a show using each of these items.

<u>Unsoundness:</u> Splints and shoe boil, what are they and how are they treated?

<u>Three Gaits:</u> Walk, trot and canter - describe the different beat and footfalls of each gait.

The Aids: Heels, weight and seat - tell how each is used.

<u>Vices:</u> Kicking and halter pulling - why do they happen and how do you stop these vices?

<u>Breeds:</u> Three light horse breeds - discuss how they are different in conformation and use. Show a picture of each.

Cooling Out: Write a paragraph discussing what cooling out is and why it is done.

The Horses Vision: Describe basically how a horse sees.

WORKBOOK 4

<u>Breed Report:</u> Choose one breed, show a picture, tell its history and discuss its different uses.

Waste Management: Write a paragraph explaining two methods of disposing of your horse waste.

<u>Conditioning the Horse for Showing:</u> Discuss how to condition the horse and why it's important to do so.

<u>Sportsmanship/Ring Etiquette:</u> Explain what they are and discuss how they are the same and how they are different.

<u>Leads:</u> Write a paragraph discussing what a lead is and how to cue the horse to take a lead.

<u>Unsoundness:</u> Ringbone, bog spavin and capped hock- what are they and how is each treated?

<u>Vaccinations:</u> Write a paragraph discussing when and why a horse needs annual vaccinations. List the most common injection sites and areas to avoid.

<u>First Aid:</u> List common items you should always have on hand in your barn and what each is used for.

WORKBOOK 5

<u>Unsoundness:</u> Fistula of the withers and heaves - what are they and how is each treated?

Vices: Barn sour and cribbing - why do they happen and how do you stop these vices?

The Age of a Horse: Discuss how a horse ages and how his teeth change with age.

<u>External Parasites:</u> Name the common external parasites and discuss how to prevent them and the treatment for them.

<u>Internal Parasites:</u> Name the common internal parasites and discuss how to prevent them and the treatment for them.

<u>Worming Program:</u> Discuss why it's important to worm your horse. Name the different types of worming medications on the market. Discuss the three methods of worming (paste, granular and tubing) and explain how they are different and the same. List the advantages and disadvantages of each medication used including costs. Outline a worming program.

<u>Diseases</u>: Pick a disease not on workbook 8 and discuss in detail including cause, treatment and expected outcome.

Shipping Fever: What is it? How is it treated and can it be prevented?

WORKBOOK 6

<u>Bone Structure:</u> Show a picture of a horse skeleton. Label the bones and discuss the ideal angles of the shoulder, hip, stifle, hock and pastern. Why are the ideal angles important to conformation and function?

<u>Breed Report:</u> Discuss one breed of draft horse. Show a picture. Discuss the history of the breed, its conformation, color and markings. Discuss the most common use of this breed and any other work/sport man may use it for.

Unsoundness: Quarter crack and sidebone - what are they and how is each treated?

Vices: Rearing and pawing-why do they happen and how do you stop these vices?

<u>Digestive System</u>: Show a picture and label parts. Discuss how a horse digests his food. Tell how the different feeds/hay are digested and used by the horse's body. Discuss how a feeding program may change depending on how the horse is used and what his physical needs are.

.<u>Colic:</u> What is it and what potential risk does it pose to the horse? What causes it and how is it treated? How can it be prevented?

<u>The Horse's Teeth:</u> Discuss how the teeth grow and wear. How does environment and food sources affect horse's teeth? What can the horse owner do to care for his horse's teeth?

<u>Muscles of the Horse:</u> Show a picture of the horse's muscles. Label the muscles. Pick a major muscle group to describe and explain how it works.

Founder: Discuss the clinical signs and causes, treatment and prevention.

<u>Equine Careers</u>: Report in depth on two equine careers including preparation and schooling.

<u>Equine Diseases</u>: Discuss the clinical signs and symptoms, mode of transmission, treatment and prevention for each of the following diseases.

Discuss prevention and control of each of the internal parasites listed below. Make a life cycle diagram and give a brief explanation of how each parasite migrates through the horse.

- 3. Verify by comparing the printout received and your copy of your sign-up sheet(some of us have fat fingers when typing in the computer) that we have the correct classes. If you need to change anything please do so on the print-out and date and initial. You may need to note that you may not be showing a particular class at this show but intend to do so at a later date or have already shown the class at a prior show but are not showing this day for one reason or another (forgot tack, can't stay, etc.)
- 4. Go in to the registration desk and pay your fees and bring any changes to the attention of the person collecting your fees.

All corrections prior to Fair need to be done by June Point Show.

Fair Sign-in will be Sunday 5-7:00. Team Comp meeting at 7:00. Must sign in during announced times to be eligible to show.

Report to the gate person at the ring in which you are to be showing. This the riders responsibility to check in to the gate person with their number and to be ready. If tack changes are required please inform the office and the gate person a couple of classes ahead. Many times the next class will enter the ring before the class in the ring is announced. Be sure to listen carefully as order or location of classes are sometimes changed, especially Showmanship and Halter.

Speed: competitors are expected to enter the ring within <u>one minute</u> of their being called. The next 5 riders will be required to be in a holding area setup near the in gate. If there is a conflict with another class they may be run out of order. Be sure to inform both the gate and the office. **You may enter the arena when the previous rider has dismounted if they will not interfere with your pattern.**Be sure you slow down, break gait, or turn away from the gate within the Control Box to avoid a 5 second penalty.




Figure 2. Reversing on the diagonal at the trot in draft horse pleasure driving.

CRITERIA EXPLANATION

MOVEMENT (60 points)

The Walk (10 points)

True, brisk and relaxed.

The Trot (30 points)

True, square, and brisk, but under full control at all times. Extreme speed will be penalized. Natural action is desirable.

Backing (20 points)

A smooth, collected and straight back.

MANNERS (20 points)

The horse should be quiet on the bit, under control and work willingly on command without being sour.

RESPONSIVENESS (20 points)

The horse should perform all transitions smoothly and willingly. The horse should back showing submission to the driver and in a straight line.

DRAFT HORSE DRIVING REINSMANSHIP

This class emphasizes the driver's ability to control his or her animal on the rail and through obstacles and other tests of driving ability. The class should be first divided into junior and senior exhibitors and then by breeds if there are enough entries.

APPOINTMENTS OF ANIMAL AND DRIVER - Appointments of animal, driver and assistant driver or groom are the same as for draft horse pleasure driving.

CRITERIA EXPLANATION

CLEANLINESS & CONDITION OF HORSE, HARNESS & VEHICLE (25 points)

Horse is properly fitted, groomed and conditioned with a clean, crisp appearance. Attention is paid to the cleanliness of harness

REINING DIVISION

"To rein a horse is not only to guide him, but also to control his every movement. The best reined horse should be willingly guided or controlled with little or no apparent resistance and dictated completely." (2000 National Reining Horse Association Pattern Book)

APPOINTMENTS OF HORSE AND RIDER - See the "Western Appointments" section of the Western Riding Division. Skid boots, splint boots and protective leg wraps are optional in reining classes.

The judge will indicate the length of the pattern with markers on the arena fence or wall. Markers within the area of the pattern may be used as a guide, but circles, figure eights and other movements do not have to be performed within the markers.

REINING PATTERN 1




Figure 18. Reining pattern 1

See figure 18 for a diagram of reining pattern 1.

- 1. Run with speed to the far end of the arena past the end marker and do a left rollback no hesitation.
- **2.** Run to the opposite end of the arena past the end marker and do a right rollback no hesitation.
- **3.** Run past the center marker and do a sliding stop. Back up to the center of the arena or at least 10 feet (3 meters). Hesitate.
- **4.** Complete one spin to the right. Hesitate.
- **5.** Complete one and one-quarter spins to the left so that the horse is facing the left wall or fence.
- 6. Beginning on the left lead, complete two circles to the left, with the first circle large and fast, and the second circle small and slow. Change leads at the center of the arena.
- 7. Complete two circles to the right, with the first circle large and fast, and the second circle small and slow. Change leads at the center of the arena.
- 8. Begin a large, fast circle to the left but do not close this circle. Run straight up the right side of the arena past the center marker and do a sliding stop at least 20 feet (6 meters) from the wall or fence. Hesitate to demonstrate you have completed the pattern.
- 9. Dismount and drop the bridle to the designated judge.

CRITERIA EXPLANATION

Judges are encouraged to score reining classes according to the NRHA scoring system, which states that all riders will enter the class with a score of 70, which represents an average run. (Scoresheets are available online at nrha.com/forms/judgesscorecard.pdf.) That score is added to or subtracted from as maneuvers are performed and penalties are added. Each maneuver should be scored according to the following scale:

- $-1\frac{1}{2}$ = extremely poor
 - -1 = very poor
- $-\frac{1}{2}$ = poor
- 0 = correct
- $+\frac{1}{2}$ = good
- +1 = very good
- +1½ = excellent

Scoring will be on the basis of 60 to 80, with 70 representing an average performance.

The following will result in a disqualification from the class:

- Failure to complete the pattern as written.
- Equipment failure that delays completion of the pattern.
- Performing maneuvers other than in the specified order.
- Including maneuvers not specified, including but not limited to backing more than two strides (two strides meaning four steps with the front feet).
- A turn of more than 90 degrees where one is not specified.
- Running away or failure to guide where it becomes impossible to discern whether the entry is on pattern.
- Jogging in excess of one-half circle or one-half the arena while starting a circle, circling or exiting a rollback.
- Overspins of more than ¼-turn.
- Use of illegal equipment.
- · Willful abuse of the horse.
- Using the reins or romal as a whip.
- · Using more than one finger between reins.
- Changing hands on the reins.
- Using two hands on the reins (except with junior horses that are ridden two-handed, or that are shown in a bosal or snaffle bit).
- Fall to the ground by horse or rider.
- Balking or refusing a command.

The following will result in a 5-point reduction:

- · Spurring in front of the cinch.
- Use of the free hand to instill fear.
- Holding the saddle or touching or petting the horse with the free hand.
- · Blatant disobedience of the horse, including kicking, biting, bucking and rearing.

The following will result in a 2-point reduction:

- Failure to go beyond markers on stops or rollbacks when it is called for in the pattern.
- · Break of gait.
- Freeze up in spin or rollbacks.
- On walk-in patterns, failure to stop or walk before executing a canter departure.
- On run-in patterns, failure to be in a canter before the first marker.
- Starting or performing circles out of lead will be judged as follows: Each time a horse is out of lead, a judge is required to deduct 1 point, which is cumulative. The judge will deduct 1 point for each quarter of the circumference of the circle or any part thereof that the horse is out of lead. The judge is required to deduct ½ point for a delayed change of lead by one stride.

Other faults and their penalties include:

- Starting a circle at a jog or exiting rollbacks at a jog up to two strides (½ point).
- Over- or under-spinning up to one-eightn of a turn (1/2 point).
- Failure to remain a minimum of 20 feet from the wall or fence when approaching a stop or rollback (½ point).
- Over- or under-spinning from one-eighth to one-quarter turn (1 point).
- Jogging beyond two strides, but less than one-half circle or one-half the length of the arena (2 points).
- When a change of lead is specified immediately before a run at the end of the arena, failure to change leads will be penalized as follows:
 - Failure to change leads by one stride (½ point).
 - Failure to change leads beyond one stride but completed before the next maneuver (1 point).

Lead Penalties*

- Each time a horse is out of lead, the judge is required to penalize it by 1 point. The penalty for being out of a lead is cumulative, and the judge will add 1 penalty point for each one-quarter circumference of a circle or any part thereof that a horse is out of lead. The judge is further required to penalize a horse ½ point for a lead change delayed by one stride where a change of lead is required by the pattern. Note: A gait is specified, but no lead is specified in the instance of run-downs either on the side of the arena or through the middle of the arena, and no penalty is incurred for a horse changing leads in these areas.
- In patterns where a horse is required to run around the end of arena, the horse must be on the correct lead while rounding the end of the arena. The horse is required to be on the specified lead as soon as it completes the first straight portion of the run-around and begins to turn the corner of the arena. Failure to be in the correct lead beyond this point will result in the following penalties:
 - From the turn to the halfway position at the end wall (-1 point).
 - Beyond the halfway point up to the beginning of the run-down (-2 points).
 - It should be noted NRHA has determined there to be no correct lead on a straight line. Therefore, changing leads in a straight line is not to be penalized, though it may or may not demonstrate resistance to being dictated to completely, which must be dealt with in maneuver evaluation.
- Where a pattern requires a half circle before beginning a run-down to the other end of the arena, a failure to be on a specified lead should be penalized as follows:
 - Beyond one stride up to one-quarter circumference of circle (1 point).
 - Beyond one-quarter circumference of circle up to the entire half circle (2 points).

*Lead Penalties adapted with permission from the 2014 National Reining Horse Association Pattern Book.

· Lead is not changed before next maneuver (2 points)

Faults against the horse to be scored at the judge's discretion, but not to cause disqualification:

 Opening mouth excessively (when the horse is shown in a bit).

- Excessive jawing, opening mouth or head raising on stop.
- Lack of smooth, straight stop on haunches, bouncing or sideways stop.
- Refusing to change leads.
- · Anticipating signals.
- Stumbling.
- · Backing sideways.
- · Knocking over markers.

Faults against the rider to be scored accordingly, but not to cause disqualification:

- · Losing a stirrup.
- Any unnecessary aid given by the rider (such as talking, spurring, quirting or jerking of reins). Note: If this is deemed excessive by the judge, it may fall under "willful abuse of the horse" and result in disqualification.
- Failure to go beyond markers on rollbacks and stops is considered a fault. Failure to run circles or figures eights within the markers is not considered a fault, depending on arena conditions and size.

REINING PATTERN 2




Figure 19. Reining pattern 2.

Exhibitors may walk or trot their horses to the center of the arena. Horses must walk or stop before starting the pattern. Begin at the center of the arena facing the left wall or fence. (See fig. 19 for a diagram of reining pattern 2.)

- 1. Complete one spin to the right. Hesitate.
- 2. Complete one spin to the left. Hesitate.
- Beginning on the left lead, complete two circles to the left, with the first circle large and fast, and the second circle small and slow. Change leads at the center of the arena.
- 4. Complete two circles to the right, with the first circle large and fast, and the second circle small and slow. Change leads at the center of the arena.

- **5.** Begin a large fast circle to the left but do not close this circle. Run up the right side of the arena past the center marker and do a right rollback at least 20 feet (6 meters) from the wall or fence no hesitation.
- **6.** Continue back around the previous circle but do not close this circle. Run up the left side of the arena past the center marker and do a left rollback at least 20 feet (6 meters) from the wall or fence no hesitation.
- 7. Continue back around previous circle but do not close this circle. Run up the right side of the arena past the center marker and do a sliding stop at least 20 feet (6 meters) from the wall or fence. Back up at least 10 feet (3 meters). Hesitate to demonstrate that you have completed the pattern.
- 8. Dismount and drop the bridle to the designated judge.





ENGLISH/WESTERN RIDING CLASS

[English/western] riding is an event where the horse is judged on quality of gaits, lead changes at the lope or canter, response to the rider, manners and disposition. The horse should perform with reasonable speed, and be sensible, well-mannered, free and easy moving. (AQHA Handbook of Rules and Regulations)

HORSE'S PERFORMANCE AND MANNERS - Horses will be judged on the riding quality of gaits, changes of leads, response to the rider, manners and disposition. Preference will be given to complete flying changes of leads midway between the markers throughout the entire class. This indicates the control of a rider over his or her mount and encourages youth to train for the event.

A rider will be penalized for losing a stirrup, using two hands on the reins (except where two hands are permitted), changing hands on the reins (except when negotiating the gate) or touching any part of the saddle with the free hand. While the horse is in motion, the rider's hands should be clear of the horse and saddle.

APPOINTMENTS OF HORSE – Appointments of horse and rider should be consistent with the seat chosen, as described elsewhere in this book. Skid boots, splint boots and protective leg wraps are optional in English/western riding classes.

APPOINTMENTS OF RIDER - Appointments of horse and rider should be consistent with the seat chosen, as described in this book.

COURSE DESCRIPTION




Figure 20. English/western riding pattern.

Figure 20 illustrates the English/western riding course. The American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) western riding pattern 2 is also acceptable; however, if it is to be used, copies of the pattern should be provided to judges and exhibitors well in advance of the class.

The eight small dots represent markers (cones or pylons are recommended). These should be separated by a uniform

distance of not less than 30 feet and no more than 50 feet. The distances may be altered if the local arena is too small.

- 1. The horse will be judged on quality of gaits, changes of lead, response to the rider, manners, disposition and intelligence.
- 2. The horse should maintain an even cadence and change leads precisely and easily, front and rear, at the center point between markers as indicated by the shaded areas on the pattern. The horse should have a relaxed head carriage showing its response to the rider's hands, with moderate flexion at the poll. The tail should remain quiet throughout the pattern. The horse should cross the log at the jog or pleasure gait and lope without breaking gait or radically changing stride.
- 3. Additional information about the pattern follows.
 - The arrows on the lines indicate the direction of travel and the type of line indicates the gait.
 - · The log should be at least 8 feet long and laid on the ground.

- The markers should be cones or pylons. In the row of five markers, the markers are separated by equal distances of 30 to 50 feet. The markers in the row of three are aligned with the first, third and fifth markers in the row of five.
 - After stopping and backing at least 10 feet at the end of the pattern, the rider will report to the judge to be excused.
- 4. A horse going off pattern is disqualified. Off pattern is any of the following: an incomplete pattern, incorrect order of maneuvers, knocking over markers, passing on the wrong side of markers, making extra loops in the pattern, missing the log, five or more simple lead changes, and failure to change leads.
- **5.** The judge may require an exhibitor to repeat or reverse any part of the routine.
- 6. Only one hand is allowed on the reins and only the index finger is allowed between the reins. Except when negotiating the gate, the hand on the rein cannot be changed. When romal reins are used they will be carried as described under "Stock Seat Equitation" in the Western Division.
- 7. The running walk or other pleasure gait is acceptable for any horses that do not jog.
- **8.** Each rider will enter the ring with a score of 70, which represents an average performance. Final scores will generally fall in a range from 40 to 80 points.
 - **Scoring guidelines:** Points will be added or subtracted from the eight maneuvers on the following basis.
 - -1 = very poor
 - $-\frac{1}{2}$ = poor
 - 0 = correct
 - +% = good
 - +1 = excellent
 - · Sample scoresheets are available online from:
 - American Quarter Horse Association Resources at aqha.com/Resources - Scroll down to the "Score Sheets" section.

 - · The maneuvers are:
 - a. Trot over the log
 - b. Trot and transition to lope

- c. Line (side) lead changes (plus or minus 1 point per change)
- d. First two crossing lead changes (plus or minus 1 point per change)
- e. Lope over the log
- f. Second two crossing lead changes (plus or minus I point per change)
- g. Lope, stop and back a minimum of 10 feet
- · An additional score of plus or minus 1 point will be given for pattern accuracy and smoothness.
- Contestants will be penalized as follows:

5 points

- Failure to change leads where indicated in pattern.

3 to 5 points

- Using the free hand to instill fear in or to praise the horse.

3 points

- Breaking gait at a lope, including a simple lead change.
- Making extra lead changes anywhere on the course.
- Breaking gait at a walk or jog for two or more strides.
- Failure to begin lope within 30 feet after crossing log.

2 points

- Failing to take a prescribed gait at the designated point in the pattern.
- Failing to change lead behind until the next change point.

1 point

- Breaking gait at a walk or trot up to two strides.
- Hitting the log.

½ point

- Touching the log lightly.
- Failing to change lead behind from one-half stride up to a cone.

Disqualifications - Failure to perform at least four flying lead changes will result in disqualification.

• The following are considered faults and should be penalized at the judge's discretion:

- Opening mouth excessively or throwing head on maneuvers.
- Anticipating signals or early lead changes.
- Stumbling.
- Losing a stirrup or holding on.
- Any unnecessary aid given by the rider, such as talking, petting, spurring, quirting or jerking the reins.


GREEN ENGLISH/WESTERN RIDING

This class will use the same rules, scorecard, scoring system, and eval—uation criteria as English/western riding. Horses may perform simple lead changes without disqualification but will receive a 3-point penalty for each simple change performed. Riders are encouraged to advance their skill in 4-H, hence those horses who perform flying lead changes in the class will earn credit over those who perform only simple changes.

AQHA green western riding patterns 1, 2 or 4 should be used. If a show offers English western riding and allows simple lead changes, the class should be listed on the show bill as green English/western riding. Only standard English/western riding (in which four or more simple lead changes results in disqualification) will be offered at the Michigan State 4–H Horse Show.







Versatility Rules:

All riders will enter the ring in Western attire first. You may wear your English attire under your jeans or chaps, your English shirt under your Western shirt to help save time when changing tack in the arena.

You will be judged on Western rail work first. Once the Western portion is completed, the judge will have the announcer call you to line up in the center of the ring facing the announcer's booth.

Each rider is allowed 2 helpers only. One for your saddle and one for the bridle. Each helper must enter at the CENTER of the arena (by announcer's booth) only. While the riders are lining up in the center of the arena, the helpers may enter the arena and line up along the rail. Time will start now when the judge gives the ok to run out to your rider and begin the tack change. Once the tack change is completed, each helper (including carrying tack) may exit the arena.

This is a 3-minute TIMED tack change. A penalty may occur if it's beyond the 3-minute allowed time. Example: lower points or knocked down in placings.

Once each rider has completed their tack change to English, walk off and find a place on the rail and wait until the judge gives the ok to start again.

***ALL TACK MUST BE CARRIED IN BY THE ASSISTANTS ONLY. YOU MAY NOT USE ANY ASSISTED DEVISES SUCH AS WAGONS, CARTS, SADDLE RACKS OR THE RAILINGS OF THE ARENA DURING THE TACK CHANGE!!
