REGISTRATION: Registrations are due February 25th. **NO LATE REGISTRATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED.** An accurate count of projects is needed so scheduling of the judges and project show times can be timely completed and announced. One registration form per 4-H member.

ENTRY TAGS: Each project needs an entry tag. Project tags will be available at the office or will be available at the event. Please arrive early if you need to tag your items the day of the event.

ABSENTEE FORMS: Members that cannot attend the event in person may still enter projects. You must attach a completed absentee form to each project. Forms are available at the office. Absentee Projects can be dropped off during business hours at the 4-H office on March 10 –14 or at the event on March 15th by 10am.

CLOVER BUDS: (Ages 5-7, as of Jan. 1) will be interviewed separately to ensure personal attention and encouragement. They will receive participation ribbons. Please take only 4 projects to a judge at a time. This reduces wait time for the Clover Buds.

PUBLIC SPEAKING, DEMONSTRATIONS & PERFORMING ARTS: All entrants will be contacted prior to the event and given appointment times for judging. The specific schedule will be determined by the number of entries. Registrations must include current phone numbers so the coordinator can contact you. Times: Maximum 5 minutes for individual entries and 10 minutes for group entries. You must furnish your own props, instruments, stands, tape/cd player, etc.

PROJECT JUDGING: Participants will meet with project judges for a brief interview for each project shown. Judging times will be determined after registration closes and will be based on the number entries for each project area. Projects will be divided into am judging and pm judging. Please plan to arrive to the event by 9am.

FOOD: There will be lunch available on-site and at no cost to 4-H members and their families from 12:00 to 1:00. You may also pack your own lunch or leave to get something and come back.

AWARDS CEREMONY: There will be a small awards ceremony including the style revue after pm judging concludes and award ribbons are placed. Many of our awards are now recognized during a fall ceremony, however, we will still be recognizing some other accomplishments during Spring Achievement.

PARTICIPATION RAFFLE: Each participating youth in attendance will receive one door prize raffle ticket. Youth will be able to select from a variety of prizes to enter their tickets for a chance to win that prize.

COUNTY SERVICE PROJECT: Each year, 4-H Ambassadors select a County Service Project to coordinate during Spring Achievement. This year, we will be collecting items for local animal shelters and rescues. Please bring some new items that local animals in need will love! (Food, treats, litter, combs, brushes. Blankets, toys, etc.) We will also be collecting fleece material to make crate pads.

YOU CARRY THE CLOTHING, AND THE JUDGE WILL EVALUATE YOUR PROJECTS ON CONSTRUCTION OR BUYMANSHIP. YOU MAY MODEL IN THE AWARDS CEREMONY. PLEASE HAVE A TYPED NARRATION OF YOUR PROJECT TO BE READ DURING THE CEREMONY WHILE MODELING YOUR PROJECT.

IF YOU ARE ENTERING A PUBLIC SPEAKING, DEMONSTRATION, OR PERFORMING ARTS PROJECT AND WOULD LIKE TO ALSO PRESENT IT DURING THE STYLE REVUE, PLEASE NOTE THAT ON YOUR REGISTRATION FORM.

Some samples of subject areas to cover for a notebook, a poster, or display: Veterinary science, breed and traits, diseases, general health considerations, systems (nervous, digestive, muscular, reproduction or structural), parasite prevention, genetics, conformation, housing management, feed/nutrition, training, emergency care. These are just a sample, you can present whatever you would like to share, even a photo journal or scrapbook about what you have learned in your animal project area.

DEPARTMENT 3 Beekeeping

DEPARTMENT 4 Collections

Examples include – stuffed animals, baseball cards, buttons/pins, key rings, match boxes, miniature cars etc. Project space is limited to a 2' X 3', even if the collection is free standing. This may require only a portion of the collection be displayed. Photos of entire collection are acceptable to supplement the display.

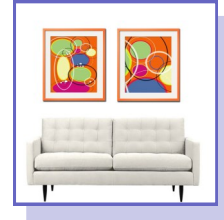

Aerospace

Section II—Technology /Engineering

Technology encompasses computer science, all types of engineered innovations/developments

Robotics including LEGO and VEX

Section III – Safety

Programs, activities, or projects that affect being secure or protected from injury, harm or loss. Includes ATV, automotive and bicycle safety, emergency preparedness, tractor safety education, etc

Section IV– Home Improvement/Repair

Activities that encompass home repair such as work in concrete, electric, plumbing, drywall, refinishing furniture

Section V—Automotive, Tractor, Small Engine

Programs, activities and projects related to apparatus used for transportation, agricultural production, lawn or garden applications, including automotive, engines, tractors and field equipment.

Section VI—Mechanical Sciences/Wood and Metal Work

Associated with mechanical arts made, performed or operated by machinery including wood science and industrial arts, designing and using technical plans, developing dexterity and familiarity with tools, machines and process for construction and repair engineering

DEPARTMENT 16 Leisure Education and Health & Fitness

Leisure Education is learning or teaching about the things a person can do during their free time and learning to transform free time into self-discovery and personal fulfillment through activities such as bicycling, golf, bowling, reading, listening to music, hiking, etc.

Health and Fitness relates to the body's well-being, maintenance of well-being, and learning about and participating in exercise of any kind. Includes sports, physical health, first aid/CPR, mental and emotional health, smoking cessation, etc
