

Secret Love Life of Birds

Reminder: Tollgate gardeners and supporters meet on Zoom in January, February and March.

Join gardeners on Zoom shortly after Valentine's Day to learn about the love lives of birds. In an adult education program, we will look at everything from medieval folklore around birds as symbols of love to modern DNA testing that provides insight into whether monogamy among birds is fact or myth. The program includes how birds "do it," why some birds have more elaborate attraction techniques than others, and what to watch for in your backyard as we transition from winter to spring mating behaviors.

Naturalist and educator for nearly 20 years, **Laurel Zoet** has worked for Michigan DNR, Huron-Clinton Metroparks, West Bloomfield Parks and Recreation, and nature centers. In 2013 she started a nature education business to travel the state teaching about Michigan wildlife and ecology at schools, libraries, scout troops, and senior facilities. In 2017 Laurel and her husband opened Wild Birds Unlimited nature shop at the Green Oak Village Place Mall in Brighton, Michigan, to connect people to nature through the hobby of backyard bird feeding.

Laurel teaches in-store nature education programs and offers community outreach programs to garden clubs, churches, libraries, Audubon groups, and others. She donates speaker fees to programs that provide bird feeding stations, and bird food, to local senior living and other care facilities, and classroom teachers so they can connect students to nature right outside the classroom window.

PAR Report - Kathryn Fitzpatrick

Winter has blanketed the landscape in white, but we have been busy planning greenhouse activities, which will begin right after MapleFest. We will be starting seeds for spring transplants for outdoor planting when the soil warns. In Michigan, this can be a moving target.



To help us work more comfortably and address physical limitations and challenges we will be incorporating adaptive tools (e.g. standing weeder, ergonomic hand weeders, and cultivators). The PAR Garden will be piloting the use of these tools for possible broader use at Tollgate. We will also be using sticky traps to help evaluate the insects feasting on our plants. These strips won't provide protection or minimize the populations but should give us a good idea of the need for IPM.

The PAR Garden was founded in 2002 with a charter to provide fresh produce to those who are food-challenged locally. Over the years various teams have toiled to produce an annual average of close to

3,000 pounds of fresh produce. The garden, which consists of thirty 30'x4' beds in an enclosed area at the farm, is maintained by a dedicated group of volunteers with the support of MSU Tollgate Farm staff. Our labors include prepping the beds for planting, planting, maintaining the irrigation, weeding, IPM, harvesting, preparing the produce for distribution and storage, and winterizing the garden.

Hope to see you in the garden this year or perhaps in the greenhouse very soon, Kathryn Fitzpatrick

NURSERY NOTES - Peg Palmer

February is typically the calm before the storm for the Nursery! The fall/winter chores of cleaning sprinkler heads, sorting, replacing and organizing an estimated 600 "Plant Tags" stored in large 3 ring binders will soon be completed. While these are tedious chores, they are a reminder that spring must be just around the corner!

This is also a time when I really start to wonder about how our overwintered pots will fare come spring. Typically, it is the repetitive freeze/thaw conditions of a Michigan winter that challenges the roots of perennials growing in a plastic pot. This year has been consistently cold, but maybe too cold? We surround the pots with mulch, but this insulation isn't as effective as plant roots directly in the ground, possibly with an added layer of mulch on top. We will have to patiently wait a couple more months to see how our plants have fared.

The Nursery typically opens for donations in early to mid-April, shortly after the Spring PLANTS WANTED list is published in late March. We have been publishing PLANTS WANTED lists in the spring and fall for several years to provide suggestions and guidance on what plants we have successfully sold in the past. We're hoping that this list provides you with ideas of what plants in your garden you can divide and share with us. It's looking very cold and wintery right now... but Spring is coming! Please keep the Nursery in mind as you start your spring garden clean up, and look for the PLANTS WANTED list in your inbox!

Know Your Plants: Investigating Plant Toxicity

In researching plants for that perfect addition to your garden, how often do you investigate a plant's toxic properties? How often do you come across a mention of toxicity for any plant described in a catalogue or on a plant tag? The purpose of these toxic substances in plants is for protection. They discourage insects and foraging animals. Most plants are relatively harmless to humans in that the bitter taste or initial irritation discourages further ingestion and thus limits exposure to levels that do not have lasting harm. You need to know which are dangerous at low exposures. Gardeners should be more informed about their plant selections, knowledgeable of educating visitors to the garden and taking care when working with plants that have toxic properties. **Some take away points:**

- "Poisonous" does not need to mean deadly. The dose and exposure determine the level of safety.
- Some plants can be poisonous to humans if eaten, some if you touch or get sap on your skin
- Some plants have all parts that are poisonous, others only certain parts-including pollen
- People, pets and livestock can have variable susceptibility to toxic compounds in plants.
- Because of their physical immaturity, children are more sensitive to many chemicals that do not necessarily cause the same reactions in adults.
- Know your plant's botanical name for researching for specific properties
